

Welcome To The New Kiwanis Year

Welcome to the Montana District of Kiwanis!

October 1 starts the new administrative year for Kiwanis. In the Montana District of Kiwanis, we have 37 local clubs including one in Salmon, Idaho. I am excited about this coming year because two clubs will be celebrating their 100th year, Billings and Great Falls. Then in 2021 five more clubs and the Montana District organization will be 100 years old. As we prepare to celebrate the successes of 100 years, it is time to increase resources and activities to help our youth reach their potential. We are looking toward developing a more diverse Kiwanis membership that bring new ideas and skills while maintaining our historic values of community involvement and service to youth.

The primary focus of Kiwanis Clubs is local and we have a tremendous variety of activities that are based on local youth needs. We will be exploring ways to help Clubs increase their positive impact on the community by sharing ideas and focusing resources to maximum benefit while at the same time investing in new future endeavors. We need to find ways to help teachers be successful in educating students both academically and in community service participation; provide more higher education resource opportunities through scholarships to youth that plan a career with certification programs in trade schools; and then to assist local Clubs with technical and financial resources for unique local opportunities related to community service.

Kiwanis is also an international organization with clubs in 81 countries. Besides what services the clubs provide in their own countries, the Kiwanis International organization has several programs that help children with health issues. Specifically, fundraising for Iodine Deficiency and Neo-natal Tetanus Vaccination in poor undeveloped countries. In addition the Kiwanis sponsored Circle K Clubs at the college level and Key Clubs at the high school level have initiatives to help provide clean water in undeveloped countries.

We have a lot to be thankful for in Kiwanis even as the needs and resource demands continue to increase. Whether it is opening a new park or playground, establishing a new club in a school or something as simple as reading books to young children, these activities contribute to ensuring success in future generations.

Thank you all Montana Kiwanians for the privilege of having served you as your Governor this past year, and for your hospitality as I visited your clubs and participated in some of your projects. Continue your good work in serving the children of the world and your communities. We also remember this year as the legacy of Poly Lat, our International President from the Philippines, who was also our district counselor and attended our Bozeman convention in 2013, who died in office a few days short of completing his term as President. The final numbers are still coming in, but so far it looks like about 390 new clubs were formed, with a corresponding increase in membership worldwide.

If your Club had at least 3 of the following, please fill out the online form and submit it:

1. Net increase in membership,
2. Completion of a Signature Project and Sponsorship of at least 1 SLP (Key Club, Builders Club, etc),
3. Participation by Club President and Secretary in Club Leadership Education Training (I know a lot of you did this at the District Convention in Glasgow, or online),
4. Donation of at least \$10 per member to the Kiwanis Children's Fund (including ELIMINATE). If your club completed at least 3 of these, please have your club secretary apply.

You can also recognize up to 4 members per club as a Distinguished member using the following criteria:

1. Membership and Education – Presented to the member who best exemplifies excellence in growing the club, including encouragement of members to invite new people and work toward building a stronger membership.
2. Community Impact – Presented to the member who best exemplifies excellence in service to the community through the Kiwanis club's signature and other projects and programs, and/or the club's sponsored Service Leadership Programs.
3. Our Kiwanis Image – Presented to the member who best exemplifies excellence in promoting Kiwanis in the community, strengthening the Kiwanis brand and/or making Kiwanis known as the organization that most supports children.
4. Financial Viability – Presented to the member who best exemplifies excellence in supporting Kiwanis fundraising, leading by example as an individual donor and/or demonstrating strong stewardship of and for the club's financial resources.

Please submit by the deadline which is in November, so that I can include you in the Recognition Luncheon at our Midwinter Convention in Bozeman February 28 through March 1, 2020.

Please also consider the optional Club Insurance package we talked about at my presentations and at the annual Convention, for \$3 or \$4 per person per fiscal year, submitted before October 31, using the mailing sent out to club secretaries, or through links online from the Kiwanis International website.

Thanks to Jim Greene and his team for taking over the leadership of the Montana District of Kiwanis. Keep serving with a smile!

Florencio C. "Poly" Lat, 2018-19 Kiwanis International president, September 18, 2019, after a long illness. Lat, from the Philippines, began his term on October 1, 2018, and served until his death. He was elected president of Kiwanis International during the 103rd Annual Kiwanis International Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada, USA.

"All of Kiwanis sends our heartfelt sympathies to Poly's family and friends," said Kiwanis International Executive Director Stan Soderstrom. "One of Poly's greatest dreams has been realized: helping children around the world live better lives. He often said the only difference among children is opportunity, and Poly worked tirelessly to ensure all children have the opportunity to thrive."

Daniel Vigneron, president-elect, expressed sadness at Lat's death. "He was so full of joy at our Kiwanis International convention at Walt Disney World Resort® in Florida," Vigneron said. "He was energized by seeing all his friends and colleagues." Vigneron said Lat was a true servant leader. "Kiwanis is a better organization for his membership and leadership."

Lat was a member of Kiwanis for more than 30 years. He became president of the Kiwanis Club of Inter-City Homes, Muntinlupa, Metro Manila, in 1991; lieutenant governor in 2000; distinguished district governor in 2011-12 and was a Kiwanis International trustee from 2013 to 2016. He was a charter member of the Kiwanis clubs of Inter-City Homes, Muntinlupa, Metro Manila; Manila Bay and Fort Bonifacio Global City.

Lat held multiple Kiwanis awards and honors, including the Kiwanis Children's Fund's Walter Zeller Fellowship, George F. Hixson Diamond Fellowship and its Centennial Award, the first among members in the Kiwanis Asia-Pacific Region. Under his leadership, Kiwanis received The Outstanding Philippine Leadership Excellence Award in Philanthropy for Environment from a joint project of the Rotary Club and Jaycees International.

He is survived by his wife, Susan; three children, Diane, Dan and Geline; and three grandchildren, Iñigo, Nica and Lia. Lat retired from the Philippine National Bank as senior vice president. He spent 35 years with the bank.

Power in numbers

MONTANA KIWANIS RECRUIT COMMUNITY PARTNERS TO SAVE A KIDS' CAMP.

The sun will keep shining on the children of Butte, Montana, thanks to a partnership between the Kiwanis Club of Butte and the Butte YMCA. The two groups are working together to ensure that the aptly named Sunshine Camp stays open for years, serving an increasing number of campers each summer and providing safe and fun activities for children whose families may be financially challenged. The 17-acre property has been in business since 1946, when it was set up as a camp for war orphans, says Tim Waring, a Butte Kiwanis Club member. Its mission evolved over the years, becoming a camp for children from low-income families. "A lot of these children's parents were incarcerated or the chil-

dren were in situations where they were being raised by single parents," Waring says. "For those children, it was a chance to be in a normal setting for at least a week." The Kiwanis club operated the camp for four weeks in July each year, serving children who stayed overnight for a week. But the camp needed physical upgrades, and the club needed help running activities. Operating and maintenance costs reached about \$300,000 a year. So the Kiwanis decided to pursue strategic partnerships.

First, the Building Trades Department of nearby Highlands College stepped up to help with the physical challenges. Students there were willing to help with repairing and adding onto an ex-

isting building. The Kiwanis club worked to raise \$125,000 in real and in-kind donations to expand the camp's available indoor space. The Butte YMCA provided the other piece of the puzzle. Kiwanis asked YMCA leaders if they wanted to take over the campsite for their own summer activities. They enthusiastically accepted and moved their camp headquarters to Camp Sunshine.

"What the camp really allows us to do is serve considerably more children," says Philip Kemp, the Butte YMCA's CEO.

In 2018, the YMCA and Camp Sunshine served 244 children, an increase from 184 the prior year. As the camp entered the summer of 2019, Kemp expected to serve nearly 400 children, much 17,000 camper days and provided as much as \$200,000 in scholarships to children in need.

Meanwhile, the Butte Kiwanis stay engaged. Each year, they participate by personally supplying by to help with lunch.

At this rate, the camp should be sustainable for at least the next 20 years, Waring says.

"They're much everything to save and up to us, so I feel like the facility is in a situation where it will not need a large infusion of capital for a long time." ☐

PROGRESS. Not huge, but progress nevertheless. During the month of September, we contributed \$2,070.85 toward our pledge of \$647,296 to help eliminate MNT (Maternal-Neonatal Tetanus) from the face of the world. That leaves a remainder of \$288,940.56 on our promise. Attached is the Kiwanis Children's Fund report. If you have different numbers, please let me know.

But much more importantly, that amount will protect 1,150 women plus companion protection for the 4,600 babies they will statistically have over the next decade from a hideous death! That is a good month's work. Have you done anything else this month that protected 5,750 human lives?

A hand for those who contributed this month. Miles City, Bozeman, the District, Montana Key Club District, and Hamilton Key Club. Thank you for your leadership! Anyone want to follow them?

Overall, we have protected 199,086 women plus 796,345 babies from MNT. That is 995,431 total lives!!! Great work!!!

And, maybe best of all, we have the opportunity to do it again. The remainder of our pledge would protect 160,522 women plus 642,090 babies – for a total of 802,612 total lives! Not only is this a nearly unprecedented opportunity – it is something we said we would do. That 800,000 people are waiting to see if we are good on our word!

Can we do it? Of course – we just did! Montana District's history is if we said we would do it, it was as good as done.

How? I don't have to tell Kiwanians how to raise money – we are great at it. I do believe that giving other people to share in the victory of eliminating this scourge from the face of the earth is only fair. I mean this should be an easy sell – just tell the story of how awful a death from tetanus is and how little it takes (\$1.80) to protect a woman and her babies should touch people's hearts. Additional fund raisers or a percent of current ones. Supporting our SLP efforts and inviting them to participate in ours (they are great fund raisers – who can turn down their enthusiasm?) Zeller Awards (for past presidents?) are still available. All we have to do is, "Go for it!"
