It all started a month before I took office, immediately after the District convention in Glasgow, MT. I visited a Kiwanis playground dedication in Edmonton, AB and then a very similar playground ceremony in Helena, MT where Kiwanis was the lead but the community actively supported and participated. While in Oliver, BC I browsed a weekly Kiwanis flea market that appeared to be a shopping



destination that raised money for youth and also senior living. Then while visiting relatives in Florida I attended a Kiwanis meeting with three generations of a single family. October saw the Key Club's Youth Conference in Great Falls, MT. The leadership ability of the students is amazing and the broad support of Kiwanis members and parents helped ensure the conference success. While traveling across the District I saw how Key Club and Builder's Club can work together in cleaning up a city park in Miles City, MT. Lt. Gov. Leila Hack, my wife Jeanne and I attended the monthly pot luck dinner and fundraiser in Salmon, ID that the community actively supported. Their only fundraiser is this monthly dinner and is a very successful and unique way to raise funds. Then seeing the young teachers asking about Kiwanis youth programs at the Educator's Conference in Belgrade was rewarding. A different activity occurred at the Kiwanis meeting I visited in Libby, MT. The local Public Health nurse provided flu shots. Thanksgiving week the Anaconda Kiwanis Club participated in a joint luncheon with Rotary and Lions clubs to help build community wide service.

After seeing all this diversity, enthusiasm and fulfilling of community needs supporting youth; reminds me of why I originally joined Kiwanis in Anaconda, MT. As a forester for the State of Montana, Kiwanis invited me to help them and the Key Club plant trees on the deforested hills south of the courthouse. After several years, the successful effort encouraged me to give back to the community and I became a Kiwanian. Serving helps teens develop a moral identity, which is a teenager's identity as someone who is helpful and moral, which is often incompatible with behaviors like aggression. My most frequent request as Montana District Risk Manager is for a "Certificate of Insurance (COI)". A COI provides proof of Insurance coverage (General Liability and/or Liquor Liability) to a 3rd party, typically the Owner/Landlord of a premises where a Kiwanis Club is holding an event or fund-raiser. For example: a Kiwanis club is holding a pancake breakfast in a park and the City requests proof of General Liability Insurance.

- We do not offer Certificates, but we do respond to valid requests
- We do not lend or share our Insurance with other groups
- We only insure Kiwanis managed events where Kiwanis members are involved & present

You can find a Standard COI in the "2019-20 Risk Management" Information" booklet that is mailed to every Kiwanis club Secretary every year. A Kiwanis Club officer may issue a standard Certificate; but you must follow the instructions to a T and you may not add, alter, delete or change the Certificate in any way! An altered Certificate is Null & Void! Then, send to your 3rd party and email a copy to Kiwanis International Insurance group Broker, The Hylant Group at kiwaniscert@hylant.com.

If your 3rd party requires "Additional insured" status; you may not issue this Certificate. Complete the "Certificate of Insurance Request with Additional Insured Wording" form and send Kiwanis International Insurance Broker, The Hylant Group <u>kiwaniscert@hylant.com</u>.

We have an obligation to promote safety and protect the public. Our International Insurance program, paid for as a part of your dues; provides Kiwanis Clubs a great advantage at fund-raising. We need to "Protect the Kiwanis Mission"; so I am always happy to discuss your projects & fundraisers and offer Risk Management tips to avoid, prevent and/or reduce risks.

If you are serving beer, wine or liquor at any Kiwanis events; I would appreciate a call to discuss.


