Montana District Of Kiwanis Signature Project Playgrounds & Children



What is memorable about your most recent Kiwanis Moment? For many, it's when we realize how well we have just connected with a child. The feeling of joy is felt so deeply that, well, it's nearly impossible to put into words. But as we fumble around for these words, an aura of happiness settles over us, creating an indelible memory that will be cherished for a long time to come. No surprise here; after all, we've just connected with the heart of Kiwanis: we've connected with children.

Let's jump back for a moment - to Kiwanis' grand Centennial Convention in Indianapolis in 2015. One of our own saw a wonderful opportunity for Kiwanians and Clubs to experience a new and powerful Kiwanis Moment on a grand, state-wide level . *Children's playgrounds* were featured at "ICON" [International Convention] that year and, with these, the admittedly un-original idea that Children-Playgrounds-and Kiwanis is about the most natural "fit" imaginable. Former Governor Ed Mangis returned home and, upon his return, a fire was lit: Your Montana District Board's decision that *Playgrounds and Children* measured-up as a Signature Project worthy of our Great District!

The District recently promoted this at the Mid-Winter Conference in Helena in March. The presentation made at Mid-Winter, much more briefly stated here, highlighted the following points:

- ✓ Montana Kiwanians want opportunities for hands-on projects that directly benefit kids.
- ✓ Children are children, and Kiwanis is deeply committed to children whether they live in our own town or someone else's.
- ✓ Parents never forget those who care about, and who care for their children. Never.
- ✓ Many smaller communities throughout Montana have little, if any, awareness of Kiwanis. A Kiwanis playground will change that with year-round visibility.
- ✓ By demonstrating concern for children with the construction of a playground in their community, Kiwanis becomes especially attractive with the dawning realization that we have *much more* to offer for example, B.U.G. Programs; Builders, Key, and Aktion Clubs and, yes, a new Kiwanis Club to make more opportunities available for their children.
- ✓ Playgrounds are not cheap, but this is a venture shared by many partners: for example, a community's government; its social and service organizations; and large, well-known corporate donors state-wide.
- ✓ The District's goal is that *Playgrounds and Children*, as its Signature Project, will become an annual event (made possible with the partnership described above).
- ✓ Clubs may wish to explore the feasibility of *Playgrounds and Children* on a more limited and manageable level in their own and in smaller, surrounding communities.



LAWYERS, GUNS 8. MONEY



My little brother knew Warren Zevon; and he probably wasn't thinking about Kiwanis when he wrote the song "Lawyers, Guns & Money", but having the right Insurance coverage may forestall their need.

In March, I gave a **RISK MANAGEMENT** presentation at the Mid-Winter in Helena.

There were more questions about **LIQUOR LIABILITY** than anything else. <u>Liquor Liability Insurance</u> coverage is included in the Kiwanis Insurance program on a conditional basis. <u>Liquor sales are tightly</u> controlled in Montana. This means your Kiwanis Club must have all the proper permit(s) in place, to make you legal, for the insurance to attach.

Safe to say, if you are holding an event and plan to sell beer or wine, call me.

Hard Liquor is **NEVER** included under the Montana Dept. of Revenue non-profit permit, <u>so don't go there</u>. Attached: Rules for Montana non-profits to sell & serve beer or table wine at special events. https://revenue.mt.gov/home/liquor/specialpermits

I asked my audience two insurance opinion questions: Do you think...

- 1. Do members have Medical Insurance coverage if they are accidently hurt while working a Kiwanis Event or Fund Raiser?
- 2. Does Kiwanis Insurance cover money lost or stolen from an event, or member dishonesty or embezzlement?

The correct answer to both questions is Mo. Yet a majority of the audience thought both were covered. Now this was an audience of Presidents and three Governors - past, present & future. These should be people in the know, right? WRONG! There is lots of Urban Legend when it comes to understanding Kiwanis Insurance. Annual turnover in Kiwanis officer ranks means new officers need to re-learn the ropes. Meanwhile, they are busy recruiting new members, raising money and running weekly meetings. So, Risk Management education is an ongoing part of Kiwanis operations.

Your club should strongly consider buying:

- OPTIONAL CRIME COVERAGE \$10,000 coverage with a \$250 deductible is \$125.00/Year. Higher limits are available.
- OPTIONAL CLUB ACCIDENT INSURANCE Can be purchased for club members and can choose to include an SLP Club.
 - \$10,000 Medical Excess is \$3.00 per member annually
 - \$25,000 Medical Excess is \$4.00 per member annually

Someone will of course ask, why doesn't Kiwanis International just raise dues and include this coverage. You probably missed the International Convention floor fight over raising dues \$1.00/Year to cover rising magazine costs. Both premiums can be paid from the Club's Administrative

A Skunk in the Trunk

Lyle, a Montanan through and through, recalled a story from a time when he and his twin brother were boys. His pastor visited their parents saying: "I don't want your boys to come to church!" What?!

A Back Story with Three Acts

Act One: When Lyle and his twin brother were born, the doctor announced: "Now, you have double trouble." Over the years, the brothers did their best to live up to that prediction!

Act Two: The brothers heard that if you pick up a skunk by the tail, it could not spray you. Then they saw a skunk. One brother distracted it while the other snuck around and picked it up by the tail. They were delighted – it did not spray them.

Question: We've heard of having a tiger by the tail. But what do you do when you have a skunk by the tail?

Act Three: Seeing their pastor's car nearby, they opened the trunk and threw the skunk in! Now, you know the rest of the story.

An Application

Sometimes we refer to toddlers as "little stinkers." We mean it as a term of endearment. But, what if their stench is particularly putrid?

Let me abruptly jump to our stinky spiritual nature. God's sense of smell is not desensitized; he smells our pollution. To proud religious hypocrites he says: You "are smoke in my nostrils" (Isaiah 65:5). According to Revelation 21:8, third on the list of eight behaviors that exclude sinners like us from heaven is being "vile" – "corrupt" – "detestable" – "abominable." In its simplest form the Greek word means: "to break wind quietly" – "quietly!" Even when we try to cover up our corruption by "putting it in a trunk," it stinks.

We often miss our stench because - Jeremiah 17:9 - "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick; who can understand it?" We forget that the world (systems opposing God and his ways), the flesh (our rotten sinful old nature putting up such a good front) and the devil (the one accusing us and seducing us) are our great enemies. Deeply deceived, we live at the putrid garbage dump and don't even know it. God's common grace often shields us. We assume all is well. We flaunt our participation trophies - a trophy body (which certainly will face real diminishment) – or our trophy spouse/children (in their brokenness they will certainly challenge our brokenness). How did a sweet child grow up to be like this? We had hoped for so much more. Eventually, apart from God's grace, the aroma becomes unmistakable – like a skunk in a trunk.

Pondering Who We Are

Scripture is emphatic; we are made in God's image. There is no skunk there. But, due to the rebellion of our first parents, we are spiritually dead in our sins (Ephesians 2:1). In his Narnian adventures, C.S. Lewis has the great Christ-figure/Lion, Aslan, declare: "You come from the Lord Adam and the Lady Eve. That is

both honor enough to erect the head of the poorest beggar and shame enough to bow the shoulders of the greatest emperor on earth" ("Prince Caspian").

Ponder these Scriptures:

Romans 8:7,8: "The sinful mind is hostile to God...those controlled by the sinful nature cannot please God." Ouch!

Ephesians 2:4,5 – "But, because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions – it is by grace you have been saved." What good news for stinking sinners like us.

Believing that good news gives us space to look at our old nature and see it for what it is — always promising to be better but not having any power to do so. Always promising to connect with God or others, our old nature alternates between habitual withdrawal, shallow tolerance or overpowering aggression.

When the Word became flesh, he did not stutter. The first word of his public ministry is — "Repent!" - Matthew 4:17. He's looking for leaders in repentance. "Heaven have mercy on us all — Presbyterians and pagans alike — for we are all somehow dreadfully cracked about the head and sadly need mending" ("Moby Dick," Herman Melville).

Repenting for How We Think about Who We Are

Christian and those who will follow Christ, consider your redeemed soul – that part of you that connects you with God and others and is responsive to him – responsive to what he has done for you and others - and responsive in authentic ways to others. Let's distinguish your redeemed soul from your natural self – the part of you that is disconnected from God and others in substantial ways.

Using those definitions of soul and self, only four worldviews are possible. First, naïve humanism suggests: "Love both your self and your soul." Secondly, pessimistic cynicism counters: "Neither your self nor your soul is worthy of love." Christianity teaches us: "Love your soul and deny your self." Modern culture - denying that we are made in the image of God – descendants of apes have no soul – leaves us with: "Love your self."

In "Christianity for Modern Pagans," Peter Kreeft evaluates these four options. Only Christianity is wholly true. Humanistic idealism and pessimistic cynicism are half true. Only modern culture is wholly false. And we are completely surrounded by modern culture! "The world thinks people are good and saints are better." Scripture shows us "we are sinners and saints are miracles" (p. 43).

A Pleasant Aroma to God

Fellow miracles, we who have a skunk in the trunk, through Christ's fragrant offering of himself, are now a pleasant aroma to God. Amazing! 2 Cor 2:15, 16 "For we are a fragrance of Christ to God among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing; to the one an aroma from death to death, to the other an aroma from life to life. And who is adequate for these things?"



Montana District Kiwanis and CASA of Montana Partnership Update:

Thank you to all who supported the CASA service project at Mid-Winter Conference by your generous donation of supplies. Each of the 14 CASA offices in Montana received a box of supplies following the conference with a variety of materials for the Advocates to use with the children they are working with. Thank you to the Kiwanians and members of Circle K who sorted supplies and packaged them for delivery to the CASA offices following the conference.

I am pleased to announce that all 14 CASA offices are receiving support from Kiwanis clubs in their area. Eighteen of the 39 Kiwanis Clubs are directly involved with a CASA office, and many more clubs donated supplies at the Mid-Winter Conference.

The Kiwanis Club who won the drawing for a dinner to be cooked by Past Governor Joe Burst for their participation in the Kiwanis/CASA 1st Lady Project is the Kiwanis Club of Polson.

Kiwanis Clubs are encouraged to maintain contact with their CASA office and continue to contribute supplies as needed, as this is an ongoing project. Many supplies are reusable and will be returned to the CASA office when no longer needed by an advocate. Consumable supplies (coloring books, crayons—which break, clay—which dries out) will need to be replaced over time. Some supplies go on sale seasonally, so be on the lookout for items that can be purchased at reasonable costs.

Activity bags are still available. Many of the CASA offices train new advocates on a regular basis, so more bags will be needed. Let us know if/when more bags are needed for your CASA office.

Again, thank you for making this project a success. **#KidsNeedKiwanis** Thorough our association with CASA, we are helping reach the many children in Montana who, through no fault of their own are in foster care.





ELIMATE maternal/neonatal tetanus

Monions! We have the opportunity of a lifetime to fulfill our commitment to "Serve the Children of the World!" We can protect over 950,000 of the most at risk and helpless people of the world from a hideous death by tetanus. Every \$1.80 contributed to the Eliminate Project will purchase the vaccine which will protect a woman of child bearing age from tetanus for a decade. Plus, statistically each woman in these areas of the world will give birth to four children. The vaccine for the mother will also give their newborn babies an immunization against tetanus for six months to a year. So, for \$1.80 we can protect five lives from Maternal-Neonatal Tetanus. If we were in K-Mart, there would be a blue light flashing. We will probably never have another opportunity in our lifetime to do so much good for so little money. If we meet our commitment to raise the remainder of our pledge, we will protect over 950,000 lives – about the total population of Montana!

The total amount we owe is a big number, so I won't scare you with it here. But it breaks down to \$67 per Montana Kiwanian per year for the next four years. That amount would protect 158 lives a year per member. That amount is not scary and the payback huge!

We can easily do it – if we just love those mothers and kids enough to do so. What it is that we need to do?

First every Montana Kiwanian, every club leader, every Lieutenant Governor, every District leader needs to make a personal commitment to reach our goal.

Then, at every level from leader to personal, we need to think as broadly as we can to come up with ideas on how to raise the funds. Undoubtedly, many Kiwanians will put in their own money to fulfill their share. But, I would like to see a great deal of the commitment filled from non-Kiwanian pockets.

Finally, we need to DO something - put these ideas to work.

Fund raising ideas.

- Buying Zeller awards (\$1,250 over up to two years that will protect 3,472 lives.) What a way to honor people Mothers on Mother's Day, Dads on Father's Day, outgoing club presidents, retiring Kiwanians, etc.
- Encourage people to give contributions to Eliminate instead of Christmas, birthday, etc. gifts.
- Start a personal "pocket change can change the world" can. At the Mid-Winter Conference one member presented Dave Curry with a can he had on his dresser to collect daily change for five years. It bought a Zeller \$1,250!!!
- Passing a change can at meetings Kiwanis and others.
- Leaving change cans at grocery stores, convenience stores, bars, banks. Any place people end up with coins in their hands.
- Having a fundraiser dedicated to Eliminate.
- Having a garage sale, individual or club, downloads our clutter and raises funds.
- Having a joint fundraiser with an SLP. Key Club has their own commitment to Eliminate, so they should be very happy to participate.
- Identifying people with big hearts and deep pockets and making an appeal to them.
- Asking businesses to contribute or match contributions
- Appealing to women's groups Ladies of the Church, Soroptimists, PEO, Red Hats, etc. There is a natural tug to a woman's heart by this project.
- Contact Philanthropic foundations.
- Give programs on Eliminate to any group you can get invited to and pass a donation can.

Kiwanians are very inventive when it comes to fundraising. What better place to apply our ingenuity than protecting these 950,000 at-risk women and children? I personally ask you to dedicate yourselves to protecting them – I beg you in their names to do so. It is literally a race between the Kiwanis funds and the grim reaper.

CHARLES "CHUCK" DISHNO

1934 - 2017



PAST DISTINGUISHED GOVERNOR MONTANA DISTRICT OF KIWANIS 1995-1996 KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL TRUSTEE CANDIDATE

Charles Edward "Chuck" Dishno was born August 4, 1934, in Bly, Oregon. Chuck was very proud of the fact that he was 4th in his high school graduation class...of four; he liked to say he was the top of the lower 25%. Although Chuck came to Dillon from Oregon, via California, he came with genuine Montana bona fides. His Mother, Lura Hartman Dishno, was born in Missoula and his Grandfather, Silas Dishno, came to the Big Hole in 1895. He bought a house and barn and a couple of hundred acres near what is now Jackson. Silas was a founding father of Dillon. If you stroll along railroad Street, heading toward the fairgrounds, you can see his name stamped into the sidewalk in front of the pretty white house he built for his wife, Melinda. Chuck's father, Ed Dishno, had a ranch in the Big Hole in the 20's. Chuck and his wife, Roz, moved to Dillon in 1989, where he started a printing business, Bannack Press, in the back room of the Sears building. 


